Ross has been with us from the beginning, both as a board member and a member of the Bresaylor history book committee. Ross also helped oversee the care of the Bresaylor Cemetery, assisting with location of burial plots. He helped frame and install the marker of names

located at the Cemetery entrance.

As many will know Ross was a fine fiddle player and continued to play at various events and at senior facilities with the Valleyview Fiddlers and with the Yellowhead Ramblers; also, at many Bresaylor events. He was joined by his brother Lyle to entertain the 2014 Pot Luck supper goers. Ross was a Councillor and then Reeve of the R.M. of Paynton, and continued to assist on various committees, especially the Fire Board, advising on the care of the firefighting equipment. He was an all round helpful guy at most anything.

BRESAYLOR MUSEUM FUTURE ...

In the last Newsletter (2015) we asked for your comments regarding the future of the Bresaylor Museum, more specifically, the future of the Bresaylor Museum in the hamlet of Bresaylor. This leading up to the Brainstorming session held July 26. Thank you so much to all for your interest and for taking the time to consider this important matter. Here are some of your comments, edited to avoid repetition....

- first, encouraging words from fellow museum folk: **Spirit River & District Museum, Peace River Country** - "Dear People of the Museum, We are another museum who are trying to keep their doors open. Keep up the good work," **George & Evelyn Lewchuk**.
- **Merrill Taylor** (David Taylor descendant) - "I'm not fully aware of many of the issues but would like to be informed or what can I help with?"
- **Lyle and Joan Currie**: "...artifacts (and possibly a building?) should be moved to either Fort Battleford or Cut Knife's museum. Both places were part of Bresaylor's story and Cut Knife has a very active museum committee...."
- **Doreen Williams** (James Bremner descendant) - "I would be saddened to see the closure of the Bresaylor Museum. Having said that, I feel there would be better opportunities for more people to learn about Bresaylor if there was a display at a larger and more accessible museum. The Battleford museum would be my choice."
- **John and Sharon Inkster** - "suggest a building in Paynton or working with the WDM. I have no idea what it would cost or what is involved but moving the building to the Museum Village that they have at that location, or getting a building on that site."
- **Helena Pike**: "...Is the problem financial?..." • **Theresa Weber**: "...Would more donations help?" • **Lois E. Sayers** - "Is there any way to get a grant from the provincial gov't. and also a Metis assoc.? I greatly appreciate all of the volunteers and think of you all and the hard work that you do!"
- **Naden Hewko** - "It is such an interesting museum. It would be nice to keep it in Bresaylor. But you need the interest and help of people who are able to keep it repaired and provide financial support." "I also am disappointed that the Federal Government's Parks Canada decided NOT to designate the Bresaylor Settlement a National Historic Event. I have read the documents you submitted and they were very well done, excellent information."
- **Shirley Kopp** (Swain/Bremner descendant) - "I'd like to commend all of you who keep the museum going... I was also sorry to hear the decision of Parks Canada. The interactive voyageur & fur trade programming sounded like a great idea of Vinessa's. I can see...moving the museum & house to another bigger centre however I hope that is unnecessary."
- **Margaret Murray** - "Dear Velma, Hope someone will come forward to replace you. The Museum should remain in Bresaylor if possible...Best of luck,"

- **Joanne (Dobie) DiSaverio** - "This is a very important issue for me. I would love to see Bresaylor Museum remain in existence. Bresaylor was the home of my Dad (Douglas Dobie) and his family... I understand the circumstances of this issue....keep the Bresaylor Museum in Bresaylor if possible. If not, since the buildings which hold the artifacts need repair, can these artifacts be housed at a new location, a place that represents the area of Bresaylor, and then have the repairs done to the museum building then turn that building into a historical type building/office idea, or tourist stop... My heart is in that place you call home, I wish I was in a position to come and help and I dream someday I can take in my Dad's home. For now for me that is not possible. I only hope it will still be there in a few years to come. With all my heart, Joanne DiDaverio (Dobie)."
- **Grace Woodcock** - "I hope the people...keep the Museum in Bresaylor where it belongs" "Sorry I'm too old (98) and too far away but wish you the best in keeping the museum in Bresaylor where it belongs! Good Luck"
- **Greg Haryett** (Sayers) - "The best option for the museum is to have the Federal Government to have it declared a historical site. However, if this is not an option then I believe it should be moved to Battleford (Fort) and have a monument put up at the present site of the Bresaylor Museum."
- **Vicki Dutton** - If Museum closed: Commemorative house at Fort Battleford for settlers who did not go to the fort for protection. Each room a piece of the history. If Museum closed: a heritage site...Walk through plaque(s) commemorating the story of the area. Interactive maps - signs at original homestead locations. Statue - Poundmaker, for protecting Bresaylor settlers. If Museum Open: Need annual budget, summer curator. Security...Budget with grants, donations, events. Annual fundraising event: Heritage Day inviting schools. Storytelling. Kids events. Round dance/Sundance/Powow - collaborate with Poundmaker. Tail gate sales. Admission. Local heritage tours.
- **Shirley Wishart** - "I regret that Parks Canada said no to designating the Bresaylor Settlement as a National Historic Event. What about National Historic Site designation?"
- **Barbara Greig** - "Please keep me up to date on the difficulties you are experiencing. You are in my prayers! Hugs, Barbara."
- **Others** who commented briefly - Glenys Oliver, Barbara Housen, Art and Mary Ann Jones, Sharron Walker, Azelia Tesolin, Gwen and Richard Zweifel, Katherine Finn, Peter St.John and Barbara Huck, Cathy Dryhorub, Louisa Schermerhorn, Emily Schellhorn, Clara Sulz and others.

The Cleophas Sayers Query

[A visit from Reg & Kay Wearley of Big Arm, Montana, USA]

Last year we received our first visit from Reg and Kay Wearley. Reg was looking for information about his great Grandfather, Cleophas Sayers, who had fled Canada after the Riel Rebellion. That visit was cut short by an emergency at home. Kay's brother was dying.

Now, just recently, the Wearleys returned, and Reg had the same query: Why did Cleophas Sayers have to flee Canada in 1885? His older brother Henry did not?

Cleophas and Marie (Caplette) Sayers were part of the original Bresaylor Settlement. Their homestead was close to Bill and Helena Caplette's farm. Once again the Wearleys parked their motorhome in the Caplette yard, and Bill and Helena helped Reg carry out his research. That included a meeting with Don Light at Battleford and a visit to the Bresaylor Museum. When the Wearleys left for home, Reg seemed satisfied that he had found out as much of an explanation about his query as is possible at this time. He will write it up and send it to us - to be included in our next newsletter. And it will be included in Bresaylor history. That was his concern, that the full story or Cleophas Sayers be part of Bresaylor history. Can any story be more so?

The BRAINSTORMING SESSION, July 26,2015

PARTICIPANTS: MAGGIE WEBB, DOROTHY

I chaired the meeting, and started by giving reasons
why the Museum should remain in Bresaylor, i.e. the
importance of place:

- 1) Bresaylor, the hamlet, lies at the centre of the area
covered by the original Bresaylor Settlement, whose
area extended from what became Delmas to
approximately what became Paynton, and from the
North Saskatchewan River to the Battle River.
- 2) Bresaylor, the hamlet, named after the original
settlement, came into being as a whistle-stop after the
coming of the railway (1905-6); representing the new
wave of settlers who arrived after the turn of the
century.
- 3) Joe Sayers Jr. started his museum in Bresaylor, and
that's where the museum continues as the Bresaylor
Heritage Museum Association Inc. The museum
buildings (and the church) are as old as the hamlet.

ROUND THE TABLE:

- Newsletter response forms were circulated and
read. Included were suggestions listed by Vicki
Dutton who could not attend the meeting.
- Then, round the table for comments, here
summarized from memory:
 - 1) MAGGIE WEBB - need to go virtual, importance
of recording information about artifacts.
 - 2) DOROTHY SCHWARTZ (from the Maidstone
Museum) - hope Museum can remain, Maidstone
interested in some items which came to Bresaylor
before Maidstone museum opened.
 - 3) MAI HINDE (Maidstone Museum) - reiterated
Dorothy's comments.
 - 4) CHARLENE DOBIE - University history
departments have young potential employees.
 - 5) BILL DOBIE - better signage. Feasibility study of
buildings needed.
 - 6) SUSAN SCHACTER - First discovered museum
last summer. Interested in museum remaining here.
Likes virtual, facebook et al.
 - 7) NADINE PAROHL - Virtual museum idea
important, museum remains here if possible. Truth &
Reconciliation issues important now.
 - 8) HELENA CAPLETTE - undecided.
 - 9) BILL CAPLETTE - Keep Special day and Pot
Luck supper.
 - 10) DON FERGUSON - buildings unsafe.
 - 11) ROSS CURRIE - no interested younger people
to help keep museum;
 - 12) MARIE FERGUSON - not realistic to
maintain.....
 - 13) MARGARET CURRIE - difficulty attracting

curator. Questionable feasibility.

- 14) MARION McDOUGALL - uncertain?
- 15) DOREEN SAYERS (Joe Sayers daughter-in-law) likes
virtual museum idea. Place important - Hopes it can stay
here.
- 16) JANET (Sayers) LOVESTONE (Joe Sayers Jr.
granddaughter) - interest in Metis history - likes
keeping museum here,

- 17) JANET'S DAUGHTER (CHERI) - in
Native studies, interested in family
Metis connections. Young family

- 18) CANON STONEHOUSE - recent
first visit to Museum; Canon English

here; church is special - architect
designed, not typical Rev. Lloyd \$200.
church packages.

little room left for follow-up discussion.
People were arriving for the supper. In any
case, time is needed to consider the points
raised in the discussion, and, nothing can be decided
quickly.

So far, since last July - -

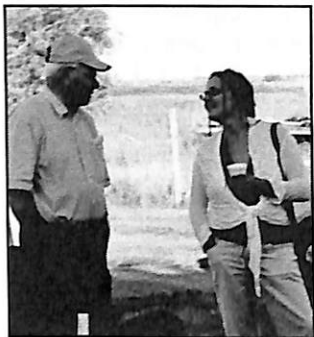
Well, we haven't moved much closer to answering

"This memory came to mind when I was watching the news report on Reconciliation - it is not only the children that were in the Residential Schools that suffered (and they did, beyond our imagination). So also did all of the Native and Metis families. Bert brought himself above all of that - was a successful business man, had a beautiful home and family. He built five homes during our married life. This shows me that we don't have to play the hand that life deals us. Get a new deck and move on."

So do we all need to move on to Truth & Reconciliation.
